World News

The tension between China and its neighbors over the South China Sea continues to heat up. Japan seized a Chinese fishing vessel that entered disputed Senkaku islands and later released the crew [1]. What's more, the new Japanese Prime Minister ordered the military to increase surveillance of the contested islands [2]. This came after Japan issued a protest over four Chinese maritime surveillance ships that spent hours in the waters of the contested islands [3]. One report suggests that China is now flying fighter aircraft into the disputed area [4]. In response, Japan plans to form a dedicated coast guard group to patrol the Senkaku islands [5]. Additionally, for the first time in 11-years, Japan plans to increase its military spending [6]. Concurrently, indications are that China is preparing its next strategic missile defense test [7].

Meanwhile, India and Pakistan clashed near the volatile Kashmir boarder [8]. India is claiming two of its soldiers were killed in the skirmish [9]. Similarly, Pakistan claims one of its soldier was killed [10]. What's more, there have been three skirmishes tied to the current crisis; keeping the armies in a state or heightened readiness [11].

In the Middle-East, reports indicate Syria has launched ballistic missiles at rebel cities located in the northern part of the country [12]. Additionally, there were reports of rebels fighting within a Syrian air base located in the northern part of Syria [13]. Another indication of the widening civil war is a report that rebels now control a large helicopter military base [14].

ne report indicates 36,000 user's personal information was breached from Army command databases [1]. Meanwhile, bad actors are exploiting a zero-day bug in Microsoft Internet Explorers versions 6, 7, and 8 [2]. In response, Microsoft issued a tool to temporary fix to the problem [3].

State sponsored cyberattacks against the US con-

tinue. For instance, the recent cyber-attacks directed against US banks appears to be the work of Iran [4]. Once again, Java exploits are in the news. A zero-date Java version 7 vulnerability is being exploited [5]. Some security experts are advising users to disable Java to avoid the widespread exploit [6]. Additionally, there is Java server malicious software (Malware) target-

ing Windows systems [7].

Energy

A ccidents are one risk with third world countries developing nuclear technology. Case in point, Iran is ordering the evacuation of a 1.5 million population city near a nuclear processing plant to flee [1]. According to the Iranian government, the city Isfahan was ordered to evacuate due to high levels of pollution [2].

All indications are that Iran will continue its nuclear weapons program. However, the rogue nation needs additional uranium to continue its nuclear enrichment. One report suggests Iran may take an estimated 50-tons of uranium from Syria [3].

One nuclear technology that offers the promise of lower risk nuclear power is Thorium. To this end, China is moving full speed ahead with developing Thorium technology [4].

Domestically, the US continues to produce more of its energy needs. For instance, fracking technology has helped the US meet 83% of its energy needs last year, the highest percentage since 1991 [5].

One side effect of uncontrolled energy expansion is pollution. Expectedly, Beijing, China reached air pollution levels considered hazardous to people [6]. Unlike the Iranian city of Isfahan; China has no plans to evacuate Beijing.

Laser Weapon Technology

For years we have worried about weapons that could take down commercial aircraft. In particular, man portable surface to air missiles have been a major concern. However, the world of science fiction is becoming the world of reality.

Case in point, a German company demonstrated a small laser system that can cut through 11 millimeters of steel at a distance of one mile [1]. The 50 Kilo-watt laser successfully downed targets during poor weather conditions [2].

Likewise, Lockheed Martin demonstrated a Laser prototype that successfully destroyed an inflight missile from approximately one mile distant [3]. However, the Lockheed Martin Laser was operating at only 10 Kilo-watts of power [4].

Nevertheless, it seems lasers are here to stay with multiple sources demonstrating their capabilities. Once these become smaller, the threats to commercial aircraft will be greater.

Economy

Regulators snuttered and first bank of the year; the Westside Community Bank in Washington state [1]. Concurrently, employment remains weak. For instance, the Labor Department reported the unemployment rate for December increased 0.1% to 7.8% [2]. While 155,000 jobs were added in December, the number unemployed actually increased by 164,000 [3]. For the week ending December 29, the number of first time unemployment claims reported by the Labor Department was 372,000; the previous week was revised upward 12,000 to 362,000 [3]. For the week ending January 5, the number of claims was reported to be 371,000 [5].

Meanwhile the one-sided trade wars continue. For instance, the Japanese currency (the Yen) hit a 29-month low against the dollar [6]. With the Fed printing trillions of

dollars, a move that should weaken the value of the dollar, why is the yen's value falling? At the same time, as the US continues to struggle through the tough economic times, China is expanding. For example, Chinese exports increased 14.1% in December compared to the year before [7]. The US trade deficit for November was \$48.7 billion [8]. In particular, the Trade deficit with China was \$29 billion [9].
