In 1994, on behalf of the United States, President Bill Clinton signed the Budapest Memorandum that requires the US to provide security assurances to the Ukraine in exchange for abandoning nuclear weapons [1]. Expectedly, once Russia took control of the Crimea, the Ukraine called on the US to honor its commitment [2]. In responding to the crisis the US is trying to calm other countries alarmed at Russian events. For instance, Vice President Biden went to Poland but expressed no plans to reverse the US decision to reduce a missile defense capability facing Russia [3].

In anticipation of Western sanctions, it appears Russia withdrew significant funds out of US treasury debt [4]. After freeing money that could have been frozen by sanctions; Russian President Vladimir Putin signed a treaty that annexed the Crimea into Russia [5]. Concurrently, reports indicate Russia is massing its military on the Ukrainian border [6]. The Russians are also reported to be taking over Ukrainian military facilities located in the new Russian territory [7]. In pointing out the obvious, one member of the Ukraine parliament is warning, his country may have to build nuclear weapons if the US and UK do not honor the pact to protect the Ukrainian border [8]. Once again, Russia teaches us the need for a strong nuclear weapons capability. Case in point, an anchor at Russian RT News stated, Russia is the only country capable of turning the US to radioactive ash [9]. Meanwhile, two Senators asked the GAO to investigate why the US State Department withheld information regarding Russian nuclear weapons treaty violations [10]. Nevertheless, the US is allowing Russian inspectors to verify reductions in the number of American nuclear weapons [11].

The real player in responding to the Russia and Ukraine crisis may be China. Readers may recall, last year China placed the Ukraine under its nuclear umbrella [12]. With Russia carving out part of the Ukraine, it is unclear what China's reaction will be. We note that China and Russia did have border fighting back in 1969 [13]. What's more, back in 1979, China invaded Vietnam as punishment for attacking its ally, Cambodia [14]. It remains to be seen what China's response will be should the Ukraine conflict continue to escalate.

The US is not only backing away from commitments made to the Ukraine but also to Asian allies. For example, the US let Japan know that it does not want to get involved with its dispute with China over contested islands [15]. In a further sign of South China Sea trouble, China prevented a Philippines ship attempting to resupply troops on one of the contested islands [16].

Terrorism

Syria continues to be a problematic area that fosters terrorist activities. For example, the Syrian government displayed a car bomb factory recently captured [1]. What's more, there is a potential to drag Turkey into the war in Syria. For example, Turkey warned rebels to expect retaliation if there is any attack on the tomb of Suleyman Shah, grandfather of the founder of the Ottoman Empire [2]. Additionally, Israel bombed several targets within Syria following a roadside bomb attack by Syrian based terrorists [3].

It is looking more likely that terrorism will once again dominate Afghanistan once the US withdraws. Case in point, a suicide bomber riding a rickshaw detonated his explosives at a checkpoint killing at least 17 people [4]. Then another suicide bomber killed at least 10 police and one civilian [5].
