### World News

In a further sign of military reductions, the Tomahawk cruise missile along with the Hellfire missile programs will be terminated [1]. This comes as the Senate hears testimony the US Army will shrink to between 420,000 and 450,000 depending on the severity of budget cuts [2]. At the same time, Secretary of Defense Hagel promised Japanese officials that two additional US Navy missile defense destroyers would be deployed by 2017 to counter China and North Korea aggression [3]. Given the reduction in military spending, it is unclear where these two ships will come from.

Unlike when Russia fought Georgia in 2008; Russian soldiers inside the Crimea were well equipped and trained [4]. With Russia's conquest of the Crimea, the US plans to isolate Russia [5]. However, the US is paying Russia \$71 million for a rocket ride to the international space station [6]. Furthermore, as the US tries to maintain its nuclear force under continuing budget cuts; Russia continues a 10-year old program to modernize its nuclear capability [7]. As a final action to spite the West; after NATO indicated they plan to move troops into would other countries along the Russian border, Russia recalled its ambassador to NATO [8]. Finally, the US is warning Russia not to invade Moldova [9].

In the South China Sea, the contest to control the water continues. In the latest exchange, a Philippine supply ship was able to maneuver around the Chinese blockade and resupply the approximate 8 soldiers that are garrisoned aboard a rusting World II transport ship beached on a coral reef [10]. The US may find itself facing China due the occupied beached ship because the reef its on is claimed by both China and the Philippines. If China decides to forcefully tow the ship, the United States-Philippines Mutual Defense Treaty may require the US to act [11]. However, as we have seen from the Russian invasion of the Ukraine, sometimes commitments are not always honored.

Meanwhile, North and South Korea exchanged artillery fire across the international maritime boundary [12]. Elsewhere, a People Liberation Army (PLA) retired general suggests war between Japan and China is more likely and that China will be victorious [13]. Fearing the Chinese may follow the Russian annexation of Crimea approach; the US warned China not to do something similar in the South China Sea [13]. In the Middle-East, Iran continues to poke its finger in the eye of the US. For instance, one of the 1979 hostage takers at the US embassy has been names a UN envoy [14].

Hackers continue to find ways to gain wealth. In the latest example, bad actors were able to steal \$1.5 million in toner cartridges through fraudulent orders [1]. Elsewhere, two hackers pleaded guilty in a New Jersey Federal

Court for trying to steal \$15 million from US bank customers [2].

Not surprisingly, the number of government information security incidents continues to rise. For 2013, 25,566 incidents were reported, up from 22,156 the

year before [3]. Readers should note, this is a minimum number because some incidents are not reported or went undetected. In any case, the 2013 number is a new record high.

## Terrorism

The war in Syria continues to test the resolve of neighboring countries. Case in point, Turkey shot down a Syrian warplane [1]. One piece suggests Al Qaeda may use Syria as a springboard to launch attacks against the West [2]. What's more, the current estimates of people killed in the Syrian conflict now tops 140,000 [3].

Some have proposed tough gun control laws to stem the risk from terrorism. However, as China has recently learned, terrorist will use any means to affect the same result. Case in point, in the latest mass murder attack, the terrorists used knives [4].

In Afghanistan, a suicide bomber was responsible for the death of at least six police officers [5]. Then in the neighboring country of Pakistan, a bomb exploded just after the former military leader, Pervez Musharraf, passed the site of the explosion [6]. This comes after Pakistan tried to restart peace talks with the Taliban terrorist group [7]. Moreover,

the number of Taliban attacks along the Afghanistan side of the border has been on the increase [8].

Meanwhile, Iraq remains a hot bed for terrorist activities. For instance, 20 Iraqi soldiers were killed when terrorists blew up a house [9].

## Economy

In the past six years, the percentage of US worker participation fell from 66% to 63%, a loss of 7.4 million workers; placing the US behind the UK for the first time in 36 years [1]. According to the Labor Department, the number of first time unemployment claims for the week ending March 22 was 311,000 [2]. Then for the following week, the number reported was 326,000 [3]. March added 192,000 jobs; unfortunately, 500,000 people entered the work force leaving the unemployment rate at 6.7% [4].

One piece points out the US middle class is losing out to China and India [5]. What the article does not address are unfair trade practices. So, while the US continues to lose jobs to China, the communist giant maintains unfair trade practices. Case in point, the World Trade Organization determined China's restriction of rare earths is unfair [6]. One opinion piece points out the treaty violators get a free pass to kill competition without retroactive consequences [7]. This illustrates the timeline that allows China years to practice unfair trade

before having to step up and say they will no longer follow the practice. In the interim, US industries go bankrupt sending jobs over seas; all while the resulting pollution is choking the planet. To illustrate the cost, the trade deficit for February was reported by the Commerce Department to be \$42.3 billion with China making up \$20.9 billion [8]. We can only hope our leaders will get some skin in the game and help the US combat unfair trade.

Meanwhile, as US industry tries to compete internationally, the US is planning to increase the minimum wage. The Congressional Budget Office estimates increasing the minimum wage to \$10.10 per hour will cost US industry \$15 billion and increase the deficit by \$5 billion over 10 years [8]. It is unclear why the focus is not on getting the number of employed people increased instead of enriching the few that are employed.
