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World News

Like so many of the Middle-East countries, Libya has digressed into a war between terrorists and a fledgling government. The fighting is so intense, the US and UK evacuated their embassies [1]. Moreover, a special forces based was overrun by militant terrorists [2]. As a consequence, terrorist fighters effectively took control of Benghazi [3]. In a further sign that war in the Middle-East is spilling over into other countries; 8 Lebanese soldiers were killed battling terrorists [4].

Much of the front page news focuses on the Gaza Strip where casualties are reported in great detail and frequency [5]. In contrast, the newly formed Islamic State (IS) is eradicating Iraq's Christian population [6]. Partially in response to the atrocities in Iraq, the US resumed limited bombing strikes against the ISIS terrorist organization [7].

Diplomacy between Russia and the US continues to erode. For example, US officials acknowledged that since 2010, Russia violated the 1987 Intermediate-range Nuclear Forces Treaty [8]. Then Russia claims its navy drove a US submarines out of the Barents Sea [9]. What's more, Russian bombers have entered US Air Defense Zones on at least 16 occasions so far this year [10].

Once again, all eyes seem to be focused away from the South China Sea. Nevertheless, there are newsworthy activities taking place. For instance, bucking international criticism, China announced plans to construct lighthouses on five islands [11]. Then, Japanese warplanes reportedly followed Chinese military aircraft flying in the disputed airspace [12]. Additionally, Japan announced they will give Vietnam six low end navy ships valued at \$5 million in response to China's actions [13]. Meanwhile, one of China's official government web sites disclosed the first images of the DF-41 ICBM, with a 7,500 mile range that can carry multiple nuclear warheads [14].

Once again, Chinese cyberattacks are in the news. The latest target of what appears to be a state sponsored attack were the computer systems at Canada's National Research Council [2]. Moreover, one report indicates three companies involved with the Israel missile defense, were hacked by China [3]. Another area where attacks are increasing is phishing exploits. By one estimate, for the month of June there were over 55,000 attacks resulting in over \$400 million in losses [4]. Meanwhile, businesses continue to struggle through malware attacks. Case in

e finally have some positive news to cover. According to the Commerce Department, the GDP grew at a 4% rate during the second quarter [1].

Never one to allow a level playing field, China continues to exploit ways to ensure unfair trade practices. Case in point, the communist giant is using anti-monopoly laws to stifle foreign companies while supporting local industry [2]. Then China is claiming to worry about US intelligence agencies and is using this excuse to restrict IBM, HP, and other companies competing in the Chinese market [3]. This is effectively helping Chinese business at the expense of foreign, including US, companies [4]. As a result, for July China posted its largest trade surplus ever, \$47.3 billion [5].

According to the Labor Department, the number of first
