The threat from China is forcing Japan to expand its military capability. Case in point, Japan is expanding its budget by 2.4 % to \$47.2 Billion; purchasing F-35s, and allocating funds for a seventh and eight Aegis destroyer [1]. What's more, one article suggests US and Japan officials are discussing a more offensive military capability for the Japanese military [2]. In the South China Sea, many countries are worried about China's expansion. For instance, China justified constructing artificial islands by claiming ownership of contested areas [3]. This comes at a time when China is actively expanding its navy [4]. Moreover, China may be working on developing a new bomber aircraft [5].

Academia may provide some insight as to what China may be preparing for. For instance, one scholar at a Chinese military university predicts World War III will result from sea disputes and China needs to be ready [6].

Meanwhile, Russia conducted another nuclear missile test and Russian leader Putin indicated the need for a strong nuclear force [7]. Concurrently, in a return to cold war area practices, Russian nuclear capable bombers are once again testing the air defenses of Europe and Alaska [8].

In the Middle-East, the Islamic State (IS) continues to advance. Case in point, using tanks and other advanced weapons, the IS terrorists captured over 20 Kurdish towns within Syria [9]. Meanwhile, the Syrian military is not attacking the IS; expecting the US to hit these targets soon [10]. In Iraq, France joined the US in bombing IS targets [11].

nce again, security patching is in the news. For instance, Microsoft's patch Tuesday included fixes for 42 bugs [1]. Additionally, Adobe released fixes for 12 security bugs [2].

Commercial businesses continues to be breached by bad actors. For instance,

the Home Deport point of sale breach could impact 56 million payment cards [3]. The breach is estimated to have gone undetected for six months and is considered larger than the Target breach [4].

So a question here is, how bad does it have to get before the US seriously starts issuing smart cards for commercial payment systems? Now that Home Depot suffered a breach; they are now all in for getting smart card readers installed at their stores [5]. But alas, as long as regulators shy away from reasonable security standard, we will expect more breaches until indus-

In central Asia, Taliban terrorists attacked a Pakistan navy dockyard, killing a sailor in the process [1]. Following this attack, Pakistan warplanes bombed Taliban hideouts, killing at least 35

militants [2].

One report cites DHS testimony before Congress in confirming the ISIS terrorist organization is planning to use the US southern border to infiltrate the US [3]. What's more, one article suggests the IS terrorists are just miles from the US border and have car bombs ready for a cross border attack [4].

The activities of the IS are not limited to the US. Case in point, Australian officials broke up a terror ring that planned to behead a randomly selected person in Sydney [5]. One potential problem with US citizens fighting in Syria is what happens when they re-

ow that China is applying the same type of trade restriction that Japan pioneered, the impact to Japan is dramatic. For instance, for the second quarter, Japan's economy contracted at a 7.1% rate [1]. To illustrate the unfair practices used; one group indicates the current Chinese anti-monopoly laws likely violate the WTO pact [2].

Unemployment still remains an uncertainty. Case in point, for the week ending September 6, the number of first time unemployment claims reported by the Labor Department was 315,000 [3]. Then for the following week, the number reported was 280,000 [4].

For the US to become competitive, the current tax burden continues to be challenging. For instance, one piece indicates the US comes in at number 32 on the International Tax Competitiveness Index [5].
