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### World News

hina continues to integrate advanced technology into its military. For example, one report indicates China is equipping its forces with blinding laser weapons [1]. Although such weapons appear to violate the Protocol on Blinding Laser Weapons treaty, we should expect their use. Consequently, the injuries in future conflicts will be much different from past encounters. This news comes after Chinese research developed a suite case sized high energy laser generator [2]. Moreover, China continues to expand its nuclear capabilities. Case in point, China tested a rail based ejection canister for its ballistic missile forces; the missile is capable of hitting targets throughout the US [3]. While China continues to enhance its military, it's also testing other countries. For the first time, China sent an armed warship into to territory claimed by Japan; prompting a Japanese protest [4]. Perhaps China is seeking a military conflict to draw attention away from its pollution problem.

It appears that the People's Liberation Army military expansion in the South China Sea is a model for Russian expansion. For instance, as part of Russia's expanding military, new bases are being added to the Artic [5]. The Artic buildup includes advanced S-400 air defense missiles, constructing 13 airfields, and 10 radar posts [6].

In Yemen, the war between different religious terrorists continues to test the Saudi border. For instance, Saudi Arabia reported it shot down a scud ballistic missile launched from Yemen that was heading toward the city of Najran [7]. Moreover, future conflict appears to be the new norm. Case in point, in spite of a cease fire, fighting left at least 31 dead in SW Yemen [8].

C oftware development Companies, that market security products, are continuing challenged. Case in point, three commercial anti-virus products were discovered to be vulnerable to code injection attacks [1]. Typically, once vulnerabilities are discovered, the next remedial step is the software patch. This is becoming a significant effort for software companies. Case in point, during one week, four companies

(Apple, Adobe, Microsoft, and Google) released patches to fix 273 vulnerabilities [2].

Another challenge is in securing private cryptographic keys. For devices such as Personal Identity Verification cards, the private signing key never leaves the cryptographic module. However, some commercial products are using weaker security approaches. For instance, one piece indicates Microsoft

inadvertently leaked the private keys associated with the xboxlive.com domain [3].

Meanwhile, a 3-year old backdoor was discovered in Juniper software; prompting the FBI and DHS to investigate a state sponsored hack [4]. This illustrates how exploits can go undetected for a long time..

A ccording to the Labor Department, the number of first time unemployment claims for the week ending December 12 was 271,000 [1]. Then for the following week, the number was 267,000 [2]. Nevertheless, in spite of warnings of the weak economy; the Fed raised the interbank lending rate 0.25 percent [3].

In contrast to increasing the cost of credit; China relies on weak environmental controls to expand its industrial base. For example, staggering air pollution in China has effectively blanketed 30 cities in the northern part of the coun-

try [4]. The pollution was so bad in Beijing that on Christmas day, 220 flights were cancelled due to poor visibility [5].
