World News

China continues to build its military presence in the South China Sea. For instance, commercial satellite photos reveal new construction of a helicopter base on Nanji Island [1]. Overall, China is constructing 5 artificial islands in the South China Sea [2]. The largest island, Fiery Cross Reef, is large enough for an airfield that could accommodate most of China's military aircraft [3]. Elsewhere, the Chinese military buildup include three new land based ICBMs [4].

While most of the world is ignoring the Russian conquest of the Ukraine, the fighting continues. For instance, Russia is using the Ukraine war to test its new electronics, tanks, and missiles [5]. Moreover, Russia, through its rebel proxies, captured 193 square miles of Ukraine territory during the past 5 months [6]. It appears the West has decided to allow Russia to conquer the Ukraine. For instance, one report indicates Germany's Angela Merkel claims the Ukraine will not be solved by military means [7]. Unfortunately, Ukraine's military cannot stop the Russian tanks [8]. As a final note, the Russian rebels are massing to attack key Ukrainian towns [9].

Meanwhile, fighting in the Middle East continues. On the plus side, the Islamic State (IS) admitted the city of Kobani fell [10]. In another positive development, Jordan launched a retaliation campaign, bombing Islamic State (IS) targets in Syria and Iraq [11]. However, there is fighting around the capital city of Damascus. Case in point, at least 21 people were killed in rocket and mortar attacks around Damascus [12].

ne risk for many systems is software vulnerabilities that are discovered after product release. For instance, one report indicates the majority of military systems have vulnerabilities resulting from older software [1]. As old software exploits are discovered, systems reliant on vulnerable code are in turn at risk.

Once again, China teaches us a valuable security lesson, if we're ready to learn. The communist giant is continuing to spur domestic chip manufacturing as a cyber-security enhancement [2]. That is, while most are focusing on software vulnerabilities, China has the foresight to address the semiconductor chips used to power information tech-

nology.

Meanwhile, the current crop of software continues to get security patches. Case in point, Apple fixed 33 bugs as part of its iOS 8.1.3 update [3].

In other troubling news, bad actors continue to exploit commercial systems. For example, the number 2

Terrorism

Radical Islamic fighting claimed the lives of 30 police commandos in the Philippines [1]. Then in Pakistan, a bomb blast to a Shiite mosque killed at least 35 people gathering for Friday prayers [2].

In the Middle-East, it looks like the Islamic State achieved another terrorist goal. Case in point, one report indicates Jordan was ready to swap a terrorist sentenced to death for both the remaining Japanese hostage and a captured Jordanian pilot [3]. However, it appears the Jordanian pilot was burned alive in a cage last January [4]. One of the consequences of burning the pilot; the United Arab Emirates withdrew from the coalition against the IS [5]. In contrast, Jordan executed two al-Qaeda prisoners, including the one demanded in exchange for the pilot [6]. Meanwhile, the IS captured another oil facility in northern Iraq [7].

The fighting in Iraq is taking a heavy toll in lives. For instance, the UN estimates at that during January, least 1,375 people were killed in Iraq [8].

The IS appears to be destroying art and literature that does not conform to its strict religious beliefs. For instance, when IS captured Mosul, its fighters removed non-Muslim books from the Central library

[9].

Moreover, it appears the IS terrorist organization is expanding beyond Syria and Iraq. Case in point, according to the DIA testimony to House Armed Services Committee, the IS now has a foothold in Libya [10]. Moreover, in the United States, 6 people (Bosnian natives) were indicted for trying to support the IS and al Qaeda terrorist organizations [11].

Another concern in the Middle-East is the stability of Saudi Arabia. For instance, on January 30, US contractors were shot at [12].

ood news for China; last year they created an estimated 13 million jobs and expect to create another 10 million this year [1]. A question here is how many of those jobs were because of unfair trade practices? In contrast, Russia's energy dependent economy is currently taking a beating with credit rating falling to junk status [2].

China continues to exploit foreign high tech industry trying to do business there. Case in point, tech companies are required to expose their internal designs and use Chinese approved encryption algorithms [3]. One sided trade eventually impacts US tech industry. For instance, IBM is currently in the process of a force reduction [4]. The question remains; how many of those jobs were lost due to unfair competition? According to the Labor De-

It should be noted that not everyone believes the Department of Labor metrics are meaningful. For instance, the CEO of Gallup believes the unemployment rate of 5.6% is not true [8].

There is more bad news for some US businesses. In a final blow, Radio Shack has filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection [10].
