World News

While the world is focusing on fighting terrorist, the major players continue to test the US resolve. In particular, Russia has taken several aggressive steps that make a miscalculation more likely. On the strategic front, Russian submarine activity has returned to cold war levels [1]. In the Baltic Sea, Russian aircraft simulated attacks against a US destroyer [2]. As the Secretary of State pointed out, the US could have shot down the Russian planes [3]. However, as another piece points out, since we are not at war with Russia, we allow their aggressive actions [4]. To further complicate matters, a Russian Su-27 fighter flew with 50 feet of a U.S. RC-135 reconnaissance aircraft [5]. Russia would not take such actions if it feared a US responce. This also means that any first strike will be devastating to the US military. When a bad actor knows they will get the first punch in for free; their goal could be to hit as many targets simultaneously culminating in a Pearl Harbor type of attack.

In the South China Sea, China's transport ministry held a completion ceremony for a 180-foot high tower now operating on Subi Reef [6]. Like Russia, China continues aggressive military actions. Case in point, one piece indicates China is launching daily cyber-attacks against US missile defense nets [7]. Meanwhile, a consequence of China's run away environmental impact is polluting the groundwater. By one sampling, 80% of underground wells were found to be polluted [8].

Elsewhere in Asia, the threat from North Korea continues. For example, there are signs they are trying to make plutonium [9]. Additionally, reports indicate a North Korean medium range ballistic missile test failed [10].

t appears the MedStar Loutage was due to ransomware [1]. In these types of attacks, malicious software encrypts valuable information. In return for a ransom payment, the bad actors will provide the decryption key. There are indications that a new strain of ransomware, that does not require human intervention [2]. As we have pointed out before, the poor design of products has left us with a mess for

which there is no easy fix. The up-front cost for including security to program design would have been small when compared to current costs. Now, much of the security work is in patch management, detection, and recovery. So for those of us that can clearly see the larger problems and know the resolution; we find ourselves powerless. As a consequence, there will be evermore losses due to cyber-vulnerabilities.

As a further indication of threats against the US and our ability to respond, consider the next two references. One report indicates the commander of the U.S. Cyber Command warned congress that China and Russia are capable of launching crippling attacks on the US power grid [3]. Another report indicates the FBI hired professional hackers to break into a locked iPhone [4]. To sum-

In Afghanistan, the Taliban announced the start of their spring offensive [1]. This is evidenced by fresh attack against the northern city of Kunduz, which briefly fell to the Taliban last year [2]. I t appears that China's latest unfair trade practices are having the desired effect. The U.S. exports to China fell to the lowest level since June 2011 [1]. Overall, the U.S. trade deficit for February increased 2.6% to \$47.06 billion [2]. Of this amount, the deficit with China was \$28,1 billion [3]. What's more, China will replace 3.5 million workers with robots by 2020 [4]. So if China will use robots to lower labor costs; why can't America?

For the week ending April 2, the number of first time unemployment claims reported by the Labor department was 267,000 [5]. Then for the following week ending April 9, the number was 253,000 [6].
