hina continues to stress its neighbors in the South China Sea. For instance, Japan fighter jets had to scramble twice as many times this year in response to Chinese incursions [1]. Furthermore, there are new concerns there will be conflict if China tries to assert control over Scarborough Shoal (located near the Philippines) [2]. This comes as reports indicate North Korea successfully launched a ballistic missile from submarine [3].

For years, the US has encouraged its allies, Japan and South Korea, not to develop nuclear weapons. However, China has not done the same with respect to North Korea. Case in point, North Korea attempted to launch additional ballistic missiles [4]. What's more, China's UN ambassador is supporting consideration of North Korea's nuclear halting proposal [5]. The question here is what does China hope to gain with nuclear armed North Korea? In response to the growing ballistic missile threat, the US is planning on including lasers for defense of incoming missiles [6].

Fighting in Syria continues to scar that country. In Northern Syria, Russia has moved artillery to positions near the city of Aleppo [7]. Concurrently, the city is under near bombardment from air strikes [8]. The airstrikes from the Syrian government included a hospital [9].

Meanwhile, Iran continues its aggressive military expansion. For instance, they launched a new space rocket; believed to be part of their ballistic missile program [10]. Iran is also marketed an invasion of Israel as recruitment tool for volunteers to fight in Syria [11].

I t appears a malware exploited a vulnerability with the Society for Worldwide Interbank Financial Telecommunication (SWIFT) system; resulting in an \$81 million loss in Bangladesh [1]. Additionally, SWIFT warned they are experiencing additional attacks similar to the one in Bangladesh [2].

Meanwhile, the critical infrastructure remains a security concern. For example, in Germany a nuclear

power plant was shut down as a precaution following the discovery of malicious software [3].

In the foreign trade wars, China continues to use whatever tools they can to gain an edge. For instance, US Steel accused China of hacking into its computers and stealing intellectual property regarding manufacturing lightweight steel [4].

The Internet continues to

be a place where viruses propagate. By one estimate, 760,000 websites are compromised annually [5]. Unfortunately, there are so many vulnerable application on the Internet; it will remain a malicious software breeding ground for some

In Kabul, a suicide car bombing killed at least 28 people [1]. Once again, the Taliban are believed to be behind the attack [2].

In Jerusalem, a terrorist bomb exploded on a commercial bus wounding at least 21 people [3]. Following the attack, the Hamas group praised that attack and called the Palestinian responsible a martyr [4]. A ccording to the Labor Department, for the week ending April 16, the number of first time unemployment claims was 247,000 [1]. For the following week, the number was 257,000 [2].

Meanwhile, the US gross domestic product was only 0.5% growth rate [3]. That works out to 0.125% actual growth for the quarter. With the population growing at a faster rate, these numbers are troubling.

On the trade front, there is a piece that indicates China is cracking down on Apple products [4]. This cannot have a happy ending for the imbalanced trade with China.

What's more, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, in 19.7% of American families, no one works [5]. As long as unfair trade policies move US jobs elsewhere, the employment picture looks problematic.

Meanwhile, banking regulators closed another financial institution, The Trust Company Bank in Tennessee became the second shuttered this year [6].
