In the South China Sea, a Chinese coast guard ship reportedly used a satellite jammer against an Indonesia warship [1]. So if China is operating electronic jammers that can block satellite communications, what will this do to drone aircraft? Concurrently, China has indicated it will ignore the decision of an international arbitration panel decision regarding the Philippines lawsuit over China's territorial claims [2].

Meanwhile, North Korea continues to enhance its military capability. One report indicates the communist country has restarted a Plutonium producing reactor [3]. This comes as the North continues ramping up its conventional military force [4]. For its part, South Korea is developing a 310 mile range ballistic missile for its 3,000-ton Jangbogo-III submarine [5].

Once again we look into the role of artificial intelligence (AI) in our systems going forward. Readers may recall, back in 2009, a centrally controlled D.C. metro train crashed into another train resulting in nine dead [6]. The NTSB reported, failure of track circuit modules caused the automatic train control system to no longer detect the first train [7]. So if the centrally controlled system observes a train going into a station, then the train disappears' can we conclude the system was okay with this condition? In other words, the fail-safe system to prevent train crashes, failed [8]. Given fail-safes sometimes fail, it is reasonable to ask how weapons in the future will operate with AI. One piece indicates the difference between human controlled and fully autonomous weapon systems can be reduced to single line of code [9]. However, autonomous operations are more likely in environments where wireless communications are vulnerable. For instance, there are low cost devices readily available that interfere with GPS systems [10].

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Security

Microsoft issued a warning of self-propagating ransomware capable of infections via removable media [1]. In turn, such risks force the race to fix security holes with patch management the major focus. For instance, Chrome issued 42 security fixes [2]. Google issued patches to correct 36 security flaws [3].

Meanwhile, state sponsored cyber-attacks continue in the news. For instance, one

piece suggests North Korea may have been involved with recent SWIFT banking attacks [4].

As noted in the World News section, commuter rail systems have been known to be vulnerable to technology problems. If the system was designed to ignore disappearing trains, that's a serious problem. Likewise, a cyber-attack to the centrally controlled computer system is equally a problem. But the risk to

critical infrastructure systems is not limited to light rail transportation. Case in point, one hacker described cyber-attacks that could potentially shut down the power grid for months [5].

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Terrorism

In Iraq, the Army is fighting the Islamic State in Falluja [1]. Note: the City of Fallujah has been under IS control for two years [2]. Meanwhile, at least 25 people were killed in Baghdad following two terrorist suicide bombings [3].

In Turkey, acts of terrorism are increasing. At least 4 were killed by a roadside bomb attack against Turkish police [4]. Additionally, a car bomb attack against a police bus in Istanbul killed at least 7 people [5]. Then a police station bombing in Southeast Turkey killed at least three people [6]. Kurdish terrorists claimed responsibility for the attacks [7].

It has been some time since Israel was in the news. However, Palestinian terrorists used guns and attacked a market in Tel Aviv, resulting in at least 4 deaths [8]. The Palestinian terrorists were dressed as Hasidic Jews [9].

The risk for additional terrorist acts against the US is in-

creasing. For instance, one report indicates illegals from terrorist controlled locations are entering the US via the porous border with Mexico [10].

Economy

According to the Labor Department, for the week ending May 28, the number of first time unemployment claims was 267,000 [1]. Then for the following week, the number of claims reported was 264,000 [2]. For May, the Labor Department reported an overall unemployment rate of 4.7% [3]. This reduced number was made possible by the further reduced labor participation rate of just 62.6 % [4]. That is, 458,000 left the work force in May. So once again, a clearly dismal employment report is made to look rosy.

In another sign of weakness, a Uranium mine in Wyoming will lay off a dozen people [5]. While this is a small number, it indicates a weakness in the nuclear energy sector. Meanwhile, Ralph Lauren announced plans to close 50 stores, cutting 1,000 employ-

ees [6].
