World News

A s part of an Asian tour, the President of the US made a visit to China [1]. While much attention was focuses on the visit, China introduced a new large dredging vessel, ideal for creating artificial islands [2]. This newest ship is causing concern throughout the region [3]. This also comes as China announced plans to construct a third aircraft carrier [4].

One topic of the Asian tour is the North Korean nuclear weapons program. One consequences of this buildup is the discussions by other countries to build their own weapons. For instance, one report indicates South, Korea, Japan, Australia, Myanmar, Taiwan and Vietnam are each exploring the need to develop nuclear weapons of their own [5]. Meanwhile, reports indicate three US aircraft carriers are involved with a 4 day military exercise with South Korea [6].

While much attention is focused on Asia, things are heating up in the Middle-East. For background, within the Middle-East there is an Islamic religious divide between the Saudi Sunni kingdom and the Iranian Shi'ite republic [7]. Recently, Saudi Arabia started the cycle with a sweeping anti-corruption campaign [8]. One report suggests the campaign was a power consolidation effort [9]. Then a missile made in Iran was destroyed following its launch from Yemen in route to a target in Saudi Arabia [10]. Next there was an oil pipeline explosion in Bahrain that was blamed on Iran [11]. Expectedly, Iran denied all involvement while Saudi Arabia enhanced oil infrastructure security [12]. Finally, there are indications that Lebanon is being pulled into a proxy war between Iran and Saudi Arabia [13].

s we looks for improving security controls, perhaps the lessons learned from bad actors can be applied. Consider the similarity of terrorist attacks. For instance, the San Bernardino shooters were radicalized by the Islamic State (IS) and extensively planned their attack [1]. In order to go undetected, they must have applied adequate security mechanisms to hide their activities. Indeed, we learned the

FBI initially could not gain access to the iPhone due to the security mechanisms of the device [2]. Now fast forward to the Las Vegas shooter, Stephen Paddock. Again, the IS claimed he was one of their people [3]. However, in order to confirm this association, investigators are looking for more evidence. It is reasonable to expect any correspondence with terrorist organizations would require security controls sufficient

to go undetected. We now learned that the hard drive to Mr. Paddock's laptop was missing [4]. In conclusion, we see massive breaches in the news, yet the bad actors seem to have ways to ensure the security of their operations.

In other news, the race to fix security bugs continues. For instance, Cisco released patches to fix 16 security vulnerabilities [5].
