World News

nce again, North Korea made news with its nuclear weapons program. The latest was a ICBM that reached an altitude of 2,780 miles before reentering the Earth's atmosphere [1]. The new missile now appears to have the range necessary to reach Washington DC and New York City [2]. Of concern to neighboring counties; the missile landed within Japan's exclusive economic zone [3]. Additionally, the Communist North is advancing test and development of submarine launched ballistic misses [4]. With all the nuclear weapons development, there are those that believe we are getting ever closer to armed conflict with the North [5]. Sanctions have not been effective against the rogue nation. Case in point, Russia provide the North with Internet access [6]. Perhaps the only country that could bring North Korea to cut back on its nuclear weapons program is China. However, when prompted to act on North Korea, China resists [7].

Next door, China continues to expand its military influence. For instance, China has finally admitted to deploying fighters in the South China Sea [8]. Additionally, China introduced two Type 056/056A Jiangdao-class corvettes designed for anti-submarine missions [9]. Then the Chinese DF-41 mobile ICBM capable of delivering 10 warheads anywhere on Earth is expected to be deployed within six months [10]. One of the consequences of China military rise is to encourage other countries to militarize. Case in point, India announced plans to build and deploy six nuclear powered attack submarines [11].

The race to fix security bugs continues. For instance, Microsoft releases patches to fix 20 security vulnerabilities [1]. Additionally, Adobe patches fixed 62 vulnerabilities [2]. Then Intel released a security patch to address multiple security vulnerabilities [3]. Finally, Cisco released patched to fix WebEx vulnerabilities [4].

Concurrent with security vulnerabilities are successful exploits. For instance, in the UK, the world's largest shipbroker, Clarkson, fell victim to a cyber attack and vowed not to pay a ransom [5].

With the number of security patches we see, it should be obvious that new programs will contain security vulnerabilities. At the extreme end, there are some recommendations to maintain paper as the ultimate backup for failures in information technology systems [6].

A ccording to the Labor Department, for the week ending November 11, the number of first time unemployment claims was 249,000 [1]. Then, for the week ending November 18, the number of claims was 239,000 [2]. Finally, for the week ending November 25, the number of claims was 238,000 [3].

On the good news side, the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) grew at a three year high rate of 3.3% [4]. Then on November 30, the Dow Jones Industrial Average broke through the 24,000 barrier for the first time [5].

In the past we have explored how "Algos" (artificial intelligence trading applications) respond to the news. On December 1, ABC news reported a story that sent the stock market on a deep decline [6, 7]. The initial market fall was approximately 300 points [8]. We later discovered the key

part of the story was false [9]. ABC suspended the source of the incorrect report for four weeks without pay [10]. Nevertheless, market volatility resulted from false information.
